From the Principal's Desk

The best part of my role as Principal is the daily interactions that I have with the students, whether it is inside the classroom, in our playground or out in the community, like yesterday when we visited Brewongle Environmental Education Centre. Our students are always happy and they are eager to learn and share their stories.

They all work hard in their classrooms and lots of positive learning is taking place, despite what they may tell you about their school day. I regularly complete walk-throughs and I love the enthusiasm that takes place in Mrs Coleman's maths classes and I particularly enjoy seeing the light-bulb moments of the students when the concept that they are learning clicks. There is lots of fantastic learning taking place in the K/1/2 classroom as well and I was pleased to be visited by two Kindergarten students who had completed some great writing about a 'hippo'. Over the past two weeks in Science and Technology, the students and I have been learning to code, that is write a series of simple steps to perform a task. We have been using code to program our robots – Dash and Cue. The squeals of delight and excitement as we interact with our robots is fantastic – who knew that learning could be so much fun.

Hawkesbury District Public Speaking Championships

Last night, Mrs Coleman, Miss Leanne and myself had the pleasure of joining the Graham family at the Hawkesbury District Public Speaking Championships, which were sponsored by Richmond Rotary Club. Cristian was a finalist at the Championships and delivered a speech about 'Holes.'

Participation in the Public Speaking Challenge enables children to:

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- Develop skills in planning, organising and outlining a speech based on a central idea that communicates a message
- Improve their speaking skills
- Understand the importance of communication in human relationships.

The competition was tough, with participation of students from across eight schools throughout the Hawkesbury. The audience listened to speeches on 'World disasters', 'Does School Success Determine Success?', and 'Human Rights and Human Wrongs' just to name a few. Cristian overcame his nerves to deliver an engaging and funny speech on 'Holes', which gained him a special commendation from the judges. Public speaking for most people is a very daunting prospect but Cristian stepped out of his comfort zone and took it in his stride speaking in front of over 80 people. We are very proud of his achievement.

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

Spotlight on Connecting on Culture Excursion

Yesterday, we enjoyed meeting up with our MMWaC friends at Brewongle EEC to learn about local Darug culture and traditions. The students were organised into four groups and rotated around the activities. At the lookout, with stunning views of the Derriban (Hawkesbury River), the students learnt about Aboriginal art and used symbols and ochre to paint their bodies. Gathering around the campfire a group of students assembled at the meeting place to learn the art of weaving and fire making. In the old school house, students were told stories about culture, the Dreaming and Aboriginal song lines by Darug educator, Erin. They were also introduced to artefacts that were used by Aboriginal people in their daily lives. The last activity involved a cultural walk around the grounds of Brewongle learning about local plants and their Aboriginal language names. Students found out about how Aboriginal people used these plants for food and medicines and learnt how the Darug people counted.
