STUDENT WELFARE

At the heart of all school activity and policy is student welfare – it embraces every aspect of schooling for every student. This involves recognising, valuing and developing each student as a unique person who has needs which must be considered and catered for...safety and security, power, belonging, fun and freedom.

Our aim is to create a safe, secure and harmonious environment in which there are clear expectations of the need for quality work, pleasant behaviour and friendly relationships. Within this environment children are encouraged to uphold values rather than follow rules – values such as cooperation, fairness, consideration, friendship, responsibility, safety, courtesy and respect. We will educate children about their rights as individuals but we will also teach them to be safe, respectful, responsible learners.

While all aspects of school life overlap, there are special programs which can be implemented to assist in meeting the various needs of students at our school, such as: classroom management, playground management, anti racism and bullying, gender equity, social skills, fair discipline, student support, peer tutoring and achievement awards.

Our prime concern is that the students of this school have an enjoyable and positive educational experience each day, receiving growth and confidence from success along the way.

ATTENDANCE

SCHOOL HOURS

Teaching hours are from 8.55am to 2.55pm. Children assemble each morning at 9am on the tennis court in classes for greetings, information and flag-raising. Morning recess is from 11.00am to 11.30am and lunch eating time is from 1.15pm-1.25pm and lunch playing time is from 1.25pm to 1.55pm.

Children should not be at school before 8.30am as there is no teacher supervision before then. A teacher supervises bus students of an afternoon with the bus leaving the school soon after dismissal time.

ABSENCES

Please encourage your child to be at school all day every day. Regular school attendance is important in terms of continuity of learning and social development. When your child is absent, please respond to the text message you will receive or please write a note for the teacher with the date and the reason – this is a legal requirement and will assist us to keep accurate records. If you know your child is going to be absent for some time, please contact the school to discuss this with your child's class teacher and/or the school principal.

Continued or regular absences and late arrivals are referred to the Home School Liaison Officer (HSLO) whose job is to check school attendance registers and make home visits.

LATE ARRIVALS & EARLY DEPARTURES

If your child arrives late to school they must first call at the Office to give an explanation and be signed into school.

If you are collecting your child before 3pm you must call at the Office first to sign them out and the office staff will collect them from the classroom.

No child will be allowed to leave the school grounds before 3pm without a parent or, with written parent permission, a known adult accompanying them.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

We consider that the wearing of the school uniform makes a valuable contribution towards the development of pride in our school, the maintenance of tone and good conduct, the development of concepts of personal neatness, presentation and self discipline and a reduction in undesirable dress distinction between children. Your co-operation in implementing our school uniform policy will be appreciated. The question of compulsion should not arise if parents support the school and back up the school uniform decisions, which were democratically evolved.

CURRICULUM

SPORT & FITNESS

The school generally has its sports days on Fridays. Days and times vary due to Sporting Schools Grant and activity undertaken that term. Students will be notified each term which day sport will be. Children should come to school dressed in their sports uniform. The school House names are: Buru, Mariong, Jamal.

The P.S.S.A. (Primary Schools Sports Association) conducts Small Schools' carnivals for Swimming in Term 1, Cross Country in Term 2 and Athletics in Term 3. We send children to all of these carnivals after our own school carnivals. Children who perform well in each of these sports progress to the District and Regional carnivals.

We are an accredited Active After Schools Communities (AASC) school and this enables us to provide expert tuition in a range of sports throughout the year.

TECHNOLOGY

The school is well equipped with computer technology and is networked and linked to the internet. Students receive opportunities to use word processing, spreadsheets and powerpoint to present assignments whilst research tasks are enriched by access to the world wide web. Digital cameras, scanners, printers and video cameras are all used by students to enhance their work.

We also have two connected classrooms equipped with an interactive whiteboard, video cameras and microphones to facilitate video conferencing and virtual excursions. Every classroom and the library has an interactive whiteboard to assist with quality teaching and learning.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

EXCURSIONS

The major excursion for the school each year is for the children in Years 4, 5 and 6. The camp is held with other small schools in the area and generally conducted in Term 4.

Other class excursions will occur during the year, based on work being covered in class. Class teachers co-ordinate these excursions and often require parental assistance for travel and supervision.

VISITING PERFORMERS

From time to time parents will be informed of the visit of various performers to the school, which both support our curriculum and are of high quality — such visits could be musical, storytelling, Aboriginal dancers, sports coaches or wildlife shows. On occasions, our school will combine with other small schools for an excursion or performance.

LIBRARY

We are fortunate to have a large, well-resourced library - at this stage the library contains approximately 6000 books. The library also has internet access and audiovisual resources. Children have class lessons and can access the library at lunchtime. For students to borrow books from the library they <u>must</u> have a cloth library bag of 50cm by 40cm or larger. Please make sure your child's name is clearly visible on his/her library bag.

ASSEMBLIES

A short morning assembly is held every day at 9am. Our more formal assembly is held every 3 weeks in the school hall on a Friday. As well as fostering school spirit and encouraging improved performance, assemblies provide an opportunity for children to share aspects of their work. Assemblies are also held at special times such as Education Week, Book Week and Presentation Day and parents are welcome to attend.

SCRIPTURE CLASSES

Scripture classes are conducted by visiting teachers on Thursday morning between 9.00am and 9.30am. Classes are held for Protestant and Catholic children. Please be sure to advise us of the class your child is to attend. We are very appreciative of the time given us by our visiting teachers.

HEALTH

If your child is unwell please keep him/her at home until well enough to return to school to work effectively. A child who is unwell is unlikely to be able to, or want to, concentrate on the activities of the day.

Some conditions are more serious and require you to take certain action and perhaps keep your child at home for extended periods.

<u>Chicken Pox</u> – excluded for 7 days after spots appear. Medical certificate required.

<u>German Measles</u> – excluded for 7 days from appearance of rash.

Head Lice – hair needs to be treated and all eggs removed.

Measles – excluded for 4 days after onset of rash or until a medical certificate is produced.

Impetigo – excluded. May return with a medical certificate if sores are completely covered by a clean dressing

MEDICATION

If a child is to have medication during school hours, the Departmental Legal and Practical Guidelines state:

"Medicine administered in school should be measured for dosage and placed in a small container to be easily taken by the child. This must also be accompanied by a permission note stating:

- ➤ Name of child
- Class
- Dosage
- Parent's signature

Medicines must be handed into the Office before school.

It is expected that children with asthma will always carry their puffer with them.

IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CHILD TO COME TO THE OFFICE FOR THEIR MEDICATION.

ACCIDENTS AND SICKNESS

In minor cases of sickness or injury, the children go to the 'sick bay' room where they will be attended to and supervised by our designated first aid officer, Mrs Aylward, until they feel better. Parents (or other contact) will be telephoned if the sickness or injury is serious. Parents are asked not to send children to school when they are obviously unwell in the morning, as they won't be able to fully participate, and it puts unnecessary strain on our resources and procedures.

It is important for parents to complete the section on the enrolment form regarding <u>emergency</u> contacts, so arrangements can be made quickly in cases of sickness or accidents.

A note explaining absences must accompany the child on their resumption of school.

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

PARENT ASSISTANCE

LABEL clearly all items your child will take to school, such as uniforms, jumpers, hats, socks, drink bottles, cases etc. Any belongings brought to school are the children's responsibility.

TAKE AN INTEREST in your child's school activities, encourage where necessary, establish reading routines and selective television habits.

DISCUSS the school rules and expectations about behaviour, cooperation and 'Maroota Manners' with your child.

HOMEWORK is given regularly each week – please be supportive and positive with your child when establishing work routines at home.

STATIONERY REQUIREMENTS will be requested of you by the class teacher.

REMIND your child about road safety as we have both buses and cars outside our school in the mornings and afternoons.

P&C MEETINGS

P & C Meetings are held on the second Wednesday of every month commencing at 2.00pm in the MOOSH building. These meetings are a forum for meeting with other parents, supplementing school resources by fundraising and discussion of issues relating to the school; major procedures and policies are endorsed at these meetings. The Annual General Meeting is held during the first month of Term 1.

There are usually two meetings per term. All parents and citizens are most welcome!

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteer helpers give their time to be of assistance in classrooms and at sporting events. Many parents work with individuals and groups on literacy or numeracy programs set by the teacher. Parents have also given their time to help with Creative and Visual Arts, cooking and sports training, and assist with transport to carnivals, performances and other excursions - which is greatly valued by the school. All volunteer helpers must sign in at the school office upon arrival.

SCHOOL EVENTS

Parents are invited to many events during the school year, including swimming, cross country and athletics carnivals; Public Education Day, Education Week and Book Week; Book Fairs; Social evenings; and Presentation Day. Parents and community members are always welcome to join us at these events as we celebrate and recognise student achievement.

COMMUNICATION

CONTACT DETAILS

The school has your address and phone numbers on file should it be necessary to contact you for any reason. If there are any changes or additions to your contact details, could you please inform the school promptly – especially mobile phone numbers and those of emergency contact.

The school should be advised in writing of any special or unusual custody arrangements. If a family is separated, a divorce has occurred, or one parent is denied access, this information should be given to the Principal to be treated with the strictest confidence. Should custody arrangements change at any time it is essential that we be advised.

NEWSLETTERS

Newsletters are issued week 3, 6 & 9 each term. They are posted on our school website, the link for which will be posted on our Facebook Page. It can also be viewed on Skoolbag. Every Thursday our Facebook page and Skoolbag is updated with a "What's On" for the following week.

PARENT CONCERNS

From time to time, parents may need to seek assistance or advice about an aspect of their child's schooling, whether it be in the classroom or the playground. The procedure is that the initial contact be made with your child's teacher but if further assistance is required then an appointment can be made with the principal to discuss the issues.

Parents are important partners in the schooling process of their child. It is important that concerns and issues are resolved (before they become problems) in order to provide the best learning environment for all students; it is through the cooperation of parents, students and staff that quality education will be achieved.

REPORTING TO PARENTS

Comprehensive written student reports are sent home at the end of Terms 2 and 4 which provide clear achievement statements for English and Maths and the other key learning areas. Parents are most welcome to arrange a mutually convenient time to speak with the class teacher to discuss progress or concerns. Teachers will also initiate a meeting if they have any concerns about your child. We would ask that you inform your child's teacher if there are any temporary changed circumstances at home which might affect your child's emotional well-being that could impact on their learning.

WEBSITE

GENERAL INFORMATION

TUCKSHOP

The Tuckshop, run by the P & C with the help of volunteer mothers, operates each Friday. Students are given a price list to keep at home. Lunch orders must be sent in a brown paper bag with the child's name, class and order written on the bag with the money inside. Parents rostered on the day of Tuckshop arrive at school at approximately 9.00am to prepare the lunch orders. Lunch orders are then delivered to the classrooms. After the children have eaten their lunch they are then allowed to line up again and buy themselves some snack foods.

Parents will be asked to assist and a roster will be drawn up. Arrangements for tuckshop will be sent home after the first P & C meeting. Without all our volunteer mothers the children would not have a tuckshop.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL

A Student Representative Council (SRC) is made up of children from Year 1 to Year 6. The SRC is a student forum which allows for leadership, discussion and planning - these students organise events for the school, such as school discos, mufti days and fundraising for certain charities. Money raised from these events goes towards buying sports equipment, gifts or items that students feel would benefit the school.

BOOK CLUB

Students are offered a selection of books through Scholastic Book Club. This offer occurs twice a term. Students are given Book Club order forms, which can be filled in and returned to the school before the closing date. Cheques are to be made payable to Scholastic Book Club.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT DAYS

School Development Days enable staff to participate in a range of activities aimed at the overall development of the school; these could include the school's management plan, examining new syllabus documents, preparing new policies or programs, goal-setting, or training and development. All schools are entitled to three School Development Days per year – occurring on the first day of Terms 1, 2 and 3. On these days students do not attend school.

PAYMENTS

Payments can be made in the office via eftpos or online from the school website with a POP payment. If paying by cheque all cheques should be made payable to 'Maroota Public School' when paying for book fees, excursions, school activities and all sports carnivals. When paying for P&C, school uniforms or P&C fundraising activities, please make cheques payable to 'Maroota P&C Association' or you can pay via eftpos in the front office.
